FINANCIAL ADMINISTRATOR'S REPORT ANNOUNCEMENTS

Thank you for your contributions!

Westminster's financial position for this year continues to be solid. Through generous giving and careful monitoring of expenses, we believe we will be able to balance the books without the need to take much, if any, from our investments.

A generous church member covered the balance of the per capita that had not been paid, which was nearly \$4000. We are grateful!

The **Building Improvement Fund** received \$71 in contributions and incurred no expenses in October. At the end of the month, the Fund has a balance of \$9,627.47. The **Major Repairs Fund** received \$39 in contributions and incurred no expenses in October. Its October Fund balance is \$36,576.69.

Giving envelopes for 2026 have been ordered and will be available in mid-December outside the sanctuary. The new envelopes are not dated, so you can use them at any time throughout the year and perhaps even into 2027.

Hope and fear

2

Our Advent theme this year invites us to think about how hope and fear are interwoven in our lives, much like it would have been for Jesus' family and their community at the time of his birth.

Luke's Gospel begins the story of Jesus with this opening line: "In the time of Herod..." This detail may seem minor to modern readers, however, it reveals layers of information about the fearful world Jesus entered, one filled with rampant oppression, economic disparity, uncertainty, and instability — a world not so unlike our own.

And yet, throughout the stories of Christ's birth, we hear the whispers of angels delivering a surprising message: "Do not fear."

In our own time, we might ask: is it even possible to be fearless in a fearful world? When Mary, Joseph, the shepherds, and the magi are each called into God's redemptive story, they do not deny their fears — they move through them. They ask questions, hold fast to courage, trust in good news, and say, "Here I am, Lord." When we find ourselves in fearful times, can we acknowledge our fears while also insisting on hope?

During this season, we'll take seriously the angels' message and trust that Christ's birth truly is



good news of great joy for all people. We won't shy away from the fear and terror looming in the background during the time of King Herod and consider the fears we hold now.

Fear can divide and paralyze us, and even be used as a tool for oppression. But what if we formed a different relationship with fear? Can we acknowledge fear without letting it rule us? Might we catalyze our fears into love and action? What if naming our fears helps us see more clearly how God is breaking in and where God is at work?

This series gently invites us to identify where fear is present — both in the Advent story and in our lives — while also finding our way toward hope, with the angels' voices in our ears.

We light candles, sing carols, and pray for Christ's coming because we believe God entered a frightened world to bring good news. We hold onto hope because we believe that Christ did come—that's the promise of the season. Our hope is not flimsy or fleeting. It's gritty, resilient, and can endure—no matter what we fear or face. This season, let us insist on hope and trust that good news is greater than fear.

November 30 First Sunday of Advent

In the Time of Herod, We Long for God to Break In LUKE 1:5-13; LAMENTATIONS 3:55-57 We begin the series by fleshing out what it might have been like to live in the days when Jesus was born—a time not all that different from our own.

Whether in exile, under the rule of a puppet king, or in the depths of personal pain, we long for God to break through the fear and bring us hope.

December 7 Second Sunday of Advent

When We're Running Out of Hope, God Is at Work MATTHEW 11:1-11; ISAIAH 43:19-21

John has spent his entire life preparing the way for Jesus, but from his prison cell, now certainly facing death, the future looks grim. Like John, even the most confident of us wonder from time to time: Is all this work worth it? Does anything I do matter? Am I on the right track? We can't always see the fruits of our labor, yet God is at work anyway. How might we,

like Jesus and Isaiah, point to the places where God is at work in our world? How might we keep hope alive?

December 14 Third Sunday of Advent

Even In Our Fear, We Sing
Luke 2:4-20; Matthew 2:1-11

This year's cantata is "Sing We Noel" arranged by Joel Raney. Through familiar choruses and beloved carols, we'll hear the good news of Christ's birth proclaimed in song and scripture.



These boxes were a big hit last year, and we are excited to offer them again this year.

Keeping Vigil on the Longest Night

A Service of Comfort, Reflection, and Hope Thursday, December 18, 6:00 p.m.

As Christmas draws near, many people feel the excitement and joy of the season. But for others, this time of year carries a different weight. Grief can feel sharper. Memories can feel heavier. Some of us are carrying burdens we can't easily name. And even those who aren't grieving may simply need a quiet, gentle space in the midst of December's constant noise.

Our Longest Night Service is a special time set aside for prayer, reflection, comfort, and hope. Held near the winter solstice—when the night is literally at its longest—this worship service offers a space to acknowledge that not everyone feels "merry and bright" during the holidays. It is a space where we can be honest about our

weariness, our grief, our fear, or simply our longing for peace.

In words shaped by tenderness, we hear again God's promise to be present with us in moments of heartbreak, loneliness, and uncertainty. Through candlelight, Scripture, quiet music, and opportunities for personal prayer and remembrance, we are invited to gently name what we carry and rest in God's compassionate presence.

Whether you are grieving a loved one, navigating illness, struggling with depression or anxiety, feeling overwhelmed by the world, or simply craving a moment of stillness—this worship service is for you. Come and keep vigil with us. Come sit in the quiet. Come rest in God's gentle light that shines even — especially — in the deepest night.

All are welcome. A brief time of fellowship and light refreshments will follow the service.

Fear Doesn't Stop Us Matthew 2:1-12, 16-18

As we end the series, Herod is still in power. Christ is born, but it feels as if the world has not changed. The magi don't let Herod's fear-driven demands stop them from honoring the newborn Christ or returning home by a different way. They model for us what it looks like to be led by hope, moving through fear without letting it paralyze you. Our journey continues, and fear won't have the last word.

Adult Bible Study also will be examining these themes on Sunday mornings at 9 a.m. and on Thursday evenings at 7 p.m. via Zoom.

A Gentle Request: How to Support Me in My Grief

Right now, I am living in a fog. My mind feels slow, my heart is heavy, and my energy and motivation are running on empty. I know you care. I know you want to help. Sometimes I'm too overwhelmed, I'm too tired, I don't know what I need, I don't know how to ask, or I just don't want to burden you.

This newsletter has been written as a sincere and gentle plea to lift the burden of asking. If you want to support me, here are some real ways you can help and provide comfort.

1. Offer Help with Specific Tasks or Necessities: Focus is not my friend, and decisions have taken on a new weight. Please do like, "Everything happens for a reason", "They not ask me what I need. Instead, tell me exactly what you are going to do and when you will do it. This removes the mental load from me.

No Request Needed: Please don't ask, "Can I bring you a meal?" Instead call or send me a message: "I'm dropping off soup and bread on your porch at 6 p.m. No need to open the door. No need to reply." (The "no need to reply" is a priceless gift.)

Handle a Specific Chore: Offer to do a task you can complete entirely on your own. "I'm coming over Sunday night to take out the trash and recycling", or "Send me your grocery list. I'll drop the bags off on your front porch Tuesday between 3-4 p.m."

2. You Have My Permission to Talk About Them: The silence surrounding their loss is one of the hardest parts of grieving. Please don't be afraid to talk about them.

Say Their Name: This comforts me and reminds me that their life mattered and that they are not forgotten. It's okay to tell me, "I was thinking about '_____' today and wanted you to know I'm thinking of you, too."

Share a Memory: Tell me a simple, positive memory. It doesn't need to be profound or dramatic. It can be short and funny. These stories are priceless to me and remind me I am not the only one missing them.



Validate My Feelings: Please avoid cliches had a good long life," or "They're in a better place." Instead, simply validate my sense of loss and feelings. "I can see you are hurting and I'm so sorry." "I don't know what to say, but I want you to know I care about you." "I can only imagine how overwhelming all of this is."

3. Don't Forget to Remember Me: My life and calendar have changed. Please think of me and include me if you can.

Invite Me: My days and nights look so different. My holidays and social calendar are different, too. Sometimes the thought of being alone is scary and overwhelming. I don't want to ask if I can join, and I don't want to put you out, but here I am wondering where my place is for these special days or lonely nights with my loved one no longer here.

Please Be Patient with Me: Low-pressured invitations are best. What I need today may not be what I needed yesterday, or will need tomorrow. I cannot tell you how I will feel the day of your invitation to that holiday meal, social gathering, or event. I may change my mind, arrive late, or need to leave early. Please know this has nothing to do with you and that I appreciate your love, thought, care, and inclusion.

and for being such a steady, caring part of our church family.







Have you ever want to attend a grief support meeting, but ...

Many people would love to find help in dealing with their grief, but are hesitant to attend a meeting. Walking through that door the first time is probably the hardest thing about attending a grief support meeting. They have so many questions that might hold them back. Is it a large group of people? Would I have to tell my whole grief story? Would I feel left out? What's the atmosphere like? Would I cry? Would I be opening old wounds? Is it only for the newly bereaved? These are concerns people have attending a grief support meeting.

Remember, first of all, every person in that room has suffered a loss, so you already have something in common. But every story is different.

Your loss may have been recent or many years ago, and you've never come to terms with it. You keep pushing it aside hoping it will go away, but honestly, it does not. It's never too late to start working on a new normal for yourself.

It seems the holiday times are the hardest to get through when we have that void in our lives. We will be discussing ways to cope and maybe start new traditions. Most of all, it's important to take care of ourselves, and we will talk about methods and suggestions to help with that also.

4. Keep Checking In: The flood of support quickly ends, but I am learning all too well that grief is a marathon.

Call, Text, or Write: Please mark your calendar to reach out to me in 3 months, 6 months, a year, etc. Birthdays, Anniversaries, Holidays, and the date they died each year can be hard. It's nice to know you are thinking of me and care.

Please do not be offended if you do not hear back from me: I'm receiving your calls, texts, and cards, and they continue to warm my heart.

Sometimes, I just don't have the words to say or the energy to respond.
