THE WESTMINSTER LOG

We are in the middle of our Lenten worship series focusing on the life and faith of Peter. Our faith is a constant journey of steadfast pursuit, one that ebbs and flows like the tide. Wandering is exploration, not necessarily distance from God. In Peter's story we see this clearly. He keeps going: he drops his nets, he walks on water, he runs to the empty tomb, he swims to the shore to meet the risen Christ. He keeps searching and yearning and loving, even after missteps or mistakes. Ultimately, in Peter's story, we are reminded that God loves imperfect people—in fact, time and again, that's precisely who God claims and calls.

As we continue through the Lenten season, we walk with Peter in figuring out faith. Along our journey, we'll wander alongside him, open to what we might learn about Jesus (and ourselves) by stepping in his shoes.

Treasurer's Report Holy Week 1

In January, the **Operating Fund** had income of \$50,581.03 and expenses of \$27,932.26. Many members pay their entire pledge at the start of the year, which is why giving is so high. I want to stress, we're grateful for your gifts no matter how you choose to give to Westminster, whether it's weekly, monthly, quarterly, or once a year! Whatever works best for you, works for us! Another way to give is to use our online giving portal. Visit www.wpcbc.org and click on the "Give Online" button. You can set up a recurring gift, at any interval you choose; that way your gifts come to Westminster even if you're not able to worship with us every Sunday.

The **Building Improvement Fund** received contributions of \$856.00 and an expense of \$649.00 for a new snowblower. At the end of the month, the fund balance is \$11,932.17. We're grateful to those who contribute to the Building Improvement Fund, allowing us to keep Westminster in great shape.

The <u>Major Repairs Fund</u> had income of \$784.000 in January. The balance at the end of the month is \$41,604.28. Thank you to those who contribute to the Major Repairs Fund.

Contributions to the <u>Capital Campaign Fund</u> totaled \$4,746.36. Currently the loan balance at the end of January is \$151,536.75. Thank you to everyone who has contributed to the Campaign. We're making great strides in paying off the principal every year.




You can still sign up to get your picture taken for Westminster's 2024 Pictorial Directory.








Food Pantry Challenge

March 3-7 Large cans of Chunky or Hearty Soups


March 10-14 Boxes of Pasta or Noodles


In the month of March the regularly scheduled Lunch and Learn series falls during Holy Week, so we will **not be meeting this month**.

The first rule of religious life in the twenty-first century begins with the awareness that the agenda for religion today will be set not by yesterday's answers but by today's questions. "I still believe there is great wisdom in yesterday's answers. Human nature has not changed that much. ...But the changes in society have set in motion major changes in the ways Jews and Christian alike responded to their respective religious traditions. (Citing a verse from Leviticus on homosexuality or pointing to a thousand years of precedent to undergird priest celibacy is no longer a persuasive argument.)"

So writes Rabbi Harold Kushner in his book - **Nine Essential Things I've Learned About Life.** Last month we began our study and discussion of the book, meeting on **Tuesday afternoons at 1:00 in the Narthex**, asking the questions relevant to our lives and faith journey.

Kushner also writes - I believe in the reality of God in the way scientists believe in the reality of electrons (unseen, except in their "happenings"). I see things happening that would not happen unless there is a God....Jim Wallis, Christian theologian writes, "When I was growing up in my Christian world, I was told the greatest battle of our time is between belief and secularism, but now I believe that real battle is …between cynicism and hope. Kushner adds - Religion can teach us not to despair.

The truth is, life is unfair, and we would do well to come to terms with that fact...The task of religion is not to teach us to bow our heads and accept God's inscrutable will. It is to help us find the resources to live meaningfully and to go on believing, even in a world where people often don't get what they deserve.

If any of these quotes from the book stir your imagination and a reflective spirit, come join us on Tuesday afternoons for the next few weeks. Each chapter is pretty well self-contained, so you need not attend each week to be an active participant. And since we know that many folks are using the book at home, if you are interested in joining the discussion for just one or two chapters that particularly speak to you, please come that week so we can reflect and learn from each other.

STAR GAZERS AND SOUL SEARCHERS

Writer and Presbyterian Pastor, Julie Hester shares each week (Email or post) a writing prompt, meant to be jumping-off points for us to write about what matters. She encourages us to use the prompts however we like—to journal, to draft thoughts for our own writing project, as meditation or prayer ideas, or for another creative endeavor. As she always says – "Grab your pen and paper, and let your words loose on the page."

Beginning in April we will have the opportunity to take some time on two Tuesday's in April, May, and June to write and share together. It has been Julie Hester's experience that when a community of folks gather there is rich cross-pollination of good ideas that get shared, re-shared, and discussed.

Fellow writer and pastor MaryAnn McKibben Dana's church in Virginia has spent some time examining how to move through the world like Jesus did, and used a four-step process as a foundational tool.

Show up...Pay attention....Tell the truth...Don't attach to the results (or Let go of the outcome....OR, as the church reframes it: "Let God handle the outcome".) These four steps have been used by many others and in a variety of settings, because these are truly lour life-long tasks.

Those four questions may not be our writing prompts when we gather on six Tuesday afternoons here at Westminster as Star Gazers and Soul Searchers, but until then, these four prompts may get you thinking about your life and your faith. 4 Lent at Westminster Ash Wednesday 5

Each month in the Log, the Spiritual Growth and Adult Formation Ministry will share a few thoughts on the journey of grief that we all experience. We hope these brief thoughts will be of help and support to all.

Grief is in two parts. The first is loss. The second is the remaking of life.

Stand beside a quiet pool of water and watch what happens when a stone is tossed into the water. The stone splashes and then settles to the bottom. Little waves ripple outward from the point of the stone's entry and disturb the water in ever increasing spheres of motion.

Death causes a similar ripple effect as it sets off upheaval our lives. The death of someone we loved is a major event. We call this the primary loss, the stone—so to speak — that lands in the pool of water. But the experience of loss doesn't end with a funeral or memorial service. Instead it sets into motion a series of subsequent losses known as secondary losses, losses that occur as the result of this death. Secondary losses create a sense that we are losing everything we have ever had or known in life and they create the impression that the pain of loss will continue forever. Secondary losses are not usually anticipated by those who are grieving the death until they are living through these other losses. And these secondary losses are usually not well understood by the other people in a griever's life.

Yet this is precisely why grieving and mourning the death of someone we loved takes time and work. Because death changes our world, part of the work of grievers is learning how to adjust to the new world we've been thrust in.



Grieving secondary losses is a normal and healthy part of learning to live in a changed world. It's important to acknowledge the losses that have already taken place, to recognize those that are currently happening, and to envision losses that the future will bring. We need to know that each identified secondary loss will require its own grief response in its own way and in its own time.

Family and friends also need to be mindful of secondary losses and the associated grief they cause. In wanting to see us happy and "getting on with life," family and friends may unwittingly deny our real feelings of grief.

Awareness, patience and understanding will enable us to move through these losses.

<u>Identifying Secondary Losses</u>

There are many examples of secondary losses you could be experiencing after the death of a loved one, family member or friend. This isn't a comprehensive list, so be aware that you may be grieving losses not mentioned. Inasmuch as each loss causes grief, secondary losses need to be individually mourned.

Most obvious is the loss of concrete things—loss of family structure, income, financial security, familiar lifestyle and support systems.

Another secondary loss that's difficult to immediately identify is the loss of identity. This comes from the change in how one defines oneself, as well as certain roles lost as the result of the death. These could include the loss of relational identity (Am I still a mother after my only child died?), loss of the caregiver role, loss of purpose as well as confidence.

Secondary losses unfold over time. You may have been acutely aware of these losses immediately following the death while others arise weeks and months later, such as the loss of memories, loss when giving away the deceased's be-

longings and the pain of watching others grieve, such as small children and elderly parents.

It may be helpful for you to identify secondary losses by writing them down. Try this:

When (name of person)
died, I lost
...my caregiving role
...my sense of humor
...my dance partner
...financial security
...the person whose advice I
trusted
