"Next 150 Years!"







*Two Coins A Meal*

In 1989 the Presbytery of Lake Huron established this partnership with the Presbyterian Church in Costa Rica. We are asked to set aside two coins as a mealtime offering. This money is collected in a fish bowl placed in the Wenona Street Lobby the second Sunday of each month.

Fifty-five percent of the offering is used to support hunger programs with children and the elderly in Costa Rica. Twenty percent is designated to the Presbyterian Hunger Program to respond to the crisis of hunger in the United States and around the world. The remaining 25% is designated to meet hunger needs in our local community.

We have noticed that the amount collected each month for Two Coins A Meal has decreased. Many people in our congregation have commented they are not sure what the program entails. We would like to take this opportunity to bring this ministry to everyone's attention, and invite you to either become active in this program again, or to consider becoming a new donor.

## ANNUAL MEETING OF THE CONGREGATION




Bonnie Marsh




## Get to Know the Presbyterian Church

**Through the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, the love of God, and the communion of the Holy Spirit, we trust in the one triune God, the Holy One of Israel, whom alone we worship and serve.**

God comes to us in free and undeserved favor in the person of Jesus Christ who lived, died, and rose for us that we might belong to God and serve Christ in the world. Following Jesus, Presbyterians are engaged in the world and in seeking thoughtful solutions to the challenges of our time.

Presbyterians affirm that God comes to us with grace and love in the person of Jesus Christ, who lived, died, and rose for us so that we might have eternal and abundant life in him. As Christ's disciples, called to ministry in his name, we seek to continue his mission of teaching the truth, feeding the hungry, healing the broken, and welcoming strangers. God sends the Holy Spirit to dwell within us, giving us the energy, intelligence, imagination, and love to be Christ's faithful disciples in the world. The name Presbyterian comes from the Greek term in the new testament for elder, presbuteros, a term used 72 times in the New Testament. The Presbyterian movement grew out of a time of among Protestants in the 16th and 17th centuries on the appropriate form of church government. Some thought the church should be governed by bishops (Greek: episkopos) and were the Episcopalian party, some by elders and were the Presbyterian party, and some directly by the congregation, the Congregationalist party.

Presbyterian church government emphasizes that the leadership of the church is shared between those called to be ministers and church members called to be elders within the congregation—we use the terms Teaching Elder to refer to ministers and Ruling Elder

to refer to church members called to be elders. This strong emphasis on Presbyterian church government is our heritage from Scottish Presbyterians.

The Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) is Reformed in its theology and Presbyterian in its church government.

In North America the first prestery was organized in 1706, the first synod in 1717; the first General Assembly was held in 1789. Today's Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) was created by the 1983 reunion of the two main branches of Presbyterians in America separated since the Civil War — the Presbyterian Church in the U.S. and the United Presbyterian Church in the U.S.A. The latter had been created by the union of the Presbyterian Church in the U.S.A. and the United Presbyterian Church of North America in 1958.

The Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) is distinctly a confessional and a connectional church, distinguished by the representation of elders in its government. The church has a membership of 1.7 million in all 50 states and Puerto Rico with nearly 10 thousand congregations and worshiping communities. ## REAL LIFE “HIDDEN FIGURES” MATHEMATICIAN IS LONGTIME PRESBYTERIAN

LOUISVILLE – “Hidden Figures”—the movie about a group of brilliant female African-American mathematicians that aided NASA during the space race—took the second spot at the box office in its first weekend of wide release, narrowly bested by “Star Wars: Rogue One.” The movie features the story of Katherine G. Johnson, a longtime Presbyterian and 2015 Presidential Medal of Freedom awardee.

Based on the non-fiction book of the same name by Margot Lee Shetterly, the film tells the true story of Johnson and her colleagues, Mary Jackson and Dorothy Vaughan, who worked as “human computers” with the burgeoning space program of the late 1950s and early 1960s. They were charged with collecting flight data and verifying that NASA’s newly introduced electronic computers had correctly calculated the details of space missions.

A member of Carver Memorial Presbyterian Church in Newport News, Virginia, for more than 50 years, Johnson served the church in several leadership roles including, not surprisingly given her gift with numbers, its finance chair.

The Rev. Dr. Brian Blount, former pastor at Carver Memorial and now Union Presbyterian Seminary’s president and professor of New Testament, called Johnson “a true space heroine, but one of the people you rarely hear about.” Blount spoke of Johnson’s humility, saying he had been the pastor at Carver Memorial for three years before he ever heard about her early work at NASA.



“She’s been a wonderful Presbyterian, [and she] served in all kinds of capacities at the church when I was there,” added Blount.

A NASA mathematician and aerospace technologist from 1953–1986, Johnson’s computations have influenced every major space program from the Mercury launches through the space shuttle program. Johnson was initially hired as a research mathematician at the Langley Research Center with the National Advisory Committee for Aeronautics, the agency that preceded NASA, after they opened hiring to African Americans and women.

Johnson exhibited exceptional technical leadership and is known especially for her calculations of the 1961 trajectory for Alan Shepard’s flight as the first American in space and for her 1962 verification of the first flight calculation made by an electronic computer, in this case for fellow Presbyterian John Glenn, the first American to orbit the earth.

She is also famed for her trajectory calculations of the 1969 Apollo 11 mission, the first human voyage to the moon and on-the-fly computations that enabled the Apollo 13 astronauts to return safely home from space. In her later NASA career, Johnson worked on the Space Shuttle program and the Earth Resources Satellite and encouraged students to pursue careers in the science and technology fields.

In addition to the Presidential Medal of Freedom, Johnson co-authored more than 20 important scientific papers for NASA. On May 5, 2016, the 55th anniversary of Alan Shepard’s historic rocket launch and splash down, the new Katherine G. Johnson Computational Research

Our December has been full of planning and preparation as we continue to have Community Health Evangelism (CHE), rickshaws, and teaching in our sights. But we also had a great visit with Michael’s parents and a very interesting Christmas celebration in our neighborhood. We want to thank you for all the support you’ve been in many different ways this year and we wish you a merry end of the Christmas season and many blessings in a happy New Year!

Our Christmas celebration was special on a number of levels. We celebrated with family and with some fellow missionaries in our city, but we also tried to do things a little the Nigerian way and slaughter a ram at our house so that we could give out meat to our neighbors. The celebration at our church was exuberant as you might expect. We also handed out some treats for the neighborhood kids (candy canes and glow sticks) and had a chance to share a little about the meaning of Christmas with many people.

Michael’s parents had a good visit with us here over Christmas. They were impressed with all the development that happened in the town over the two years we’ve been here. They were also very complimentary about how much better we’re able to get around and communicate than last time! Since they were here two years ago we didn’t take them many places besides our normal routines of the market, work, and church. But while picking them up in the capital we did get to go on a boating expedition to see hippopotamuses. It was a treat to be on the river and we were pleased that we really did get a good view of these gigantic creatures.
