Tell Me Something Good:

Grounding ourselves in the good news this Lent

Lent is often described as a season of reflection, repentance, and preparation — but at its heart, it is also a season of grounding ourselves in what truly matters. In the early church, Lent was a time when new believers prepared for baptism at Easter by studying the foundations of Christian faith. They focused on what was central to the life and ministry of Jesus and what it meant to follow him.

This Lent, we return to that same question: What is the good news at the core of Jesus' life and ministry? And just as importantly, can we trust that this good news is truly good — even when it challenges us, stretches us, or disrupts our comfort?

If we are honest, it is easy to soften or sanitize Jesus' teachings. Following Jesus leads to a richer, more expansive life, but it's not necessarily comfortable. We often describe Jesus' ministry as "radical" which comes from the Latin word "radicalis," meaning "root" or "ground." Therefore, the good news should bring us back to our roots, back to what grounds us: loving our neighbor, caring for the vulnerable, pursuing justice and mercy, and resting in God's unending grace.

The good news is extravagant, untamed, illogical, and persistent. It is joyful — like fine wine saved for celebration. It grows like a mustard seed that flourishes rapidly into a tree to shelter the birds. It smells like expensive perfume poured from an alabaster jar and like crumbling bread passed endlessly through a hungry crowd. It sounds like children laughing



and like stones dropped to the ground instead of violently thrown. It feels like feet washed with tender care. The good news is alive in the world

Throughout this Lenten season, we will explore these foundational teachings of Jesus that ground us and shape how we live. Our hope is that this series will offer fertile ground for worship, reflection, and conversation, helping us root our hearts more deeply in the expansive goodness of God.

This Lent, may we listen again for the good news. May it ground us. And may it inspire us to act in a world hungry to hear, see, and experience what is truly good.

We begin Lent with an open invitation. In Jesus' parable of the wedding banquet, though the net is cast wide, too many guests deny the invitation, instead focusing on their individual concerns. Yet, the host's invitation is persistent. They search high and low for the dispossessed and the vulnerable, perhaps those who are hungry to accept the invitation. The good news is that there is still room. God's grace is abundant, and all are welcome to the table.

This year's Ash Wednesday service will include a celebration of the Lord's Supper, the Imposition of Ashes, and both communal and individual reflective actions.

First Sunday in Lent, February 22 (Ordination and Installation of Church Officers)

John's Gospel opens Jesus' ministry with a wedding miracle. It may feel a bit lavish to start the season of Lent with a wedding banquet, but the good news begins with joy. This week we focus on the subversive and playful nature of the good news. Like a mustard seed, the good news can grow from the smallest seed into the tallest tree. Like an unruly weed, or fine wine saved for last, the good news is abundant and cannot be contained. As we sink into Jesus' teachings throughout the season, we may not always be comfortable, but we can trust that these

Second Sunday in Lent, March 1 (Sacrament of the Lord's Supper)

*The good news is...
great love for God & neighbor*
Luke 7:36-50; Matthew 25:35-40
Simon and some Pharisees host a dinner for Jesus and an unexpected guest arrives: a woman from the city who kneels at Jesus' feet and washes him with expensive perfume. Simon scoffs at this party foul, but Jesus reorients his focus, asking him to truly see the woman and recognize that she has shown "great love." The woman with the alabaster jar shows a shocking, extravagant love that exemplifies the greatest commandment: to love God with all your heart, soul, and mind and to love your neighbor as yourself. Will the other guests see that loving God goes hand in hand with loving neighbor?

Update on church finances

As you can see and as is normal, we are starting the year with expenses (primarily payroll) exceeding income. However, because of your generous giving last year, we have enough cash on hand to cover these expenses without needing to tap our investments.

Let's talk per capita! Per capita has been a part of the funding history of the Presbyterian Church for over 150 years. It funds the necessary expenses of the presbyteries, synods, and the General Assembly, and allows these governing councils to make decisions regarding distribution of mission dollars without being funded by those same dollars.

The 2026 per capita is \$35 per member, with \$20.34 going to the Presbytery of Lake Huron, \$3.40 to the Synod of the Covenant, and \$11.26 to the General Assembly. The amount each church pays is based on its membership as of December 31, 2024. Westminster's membership at that time was 292, so the per capita amount we will pay is \$10,220.

That amount is due to be paid by February 15. If each of our members pays the per

capita amount above his/his pledge or regular giving, it keeps pledged funds in our church for our budgeted use. You can pay your per capita in any of the same ways you currently pay your regular offering; just use the special per capita envelope or make a note that that is what the payment is for and we will credit it accordingly.

Pledge

For many of us, the word pledge can stir up mixed feelings. Outside the church, it can sound formal—or even intimidating—often associated with contracts or promises we're afraid we might not be able to keep.

In the life of the church, though, a pledge means something a little different—and something deeply faithful.

What Is a Pledge?

In a Presbyterian congregation, a pledge is an estimate of what you hope to give in the coming year in support of the church's ministry and mission. It is a way of sharing your intention, offered prayerfully and honestly, based on what you believe you can give at this point in your life.

A pledge is not a bill or a binding contract. It is not set in stone. Life changes, circumstances change, and because of that, pledges can be amended at any time—up or down—with grace and understanding.

Why Do Pledges Matter?

While pledges are not binding, they are incredibly helpful. Together, they allow the church to:

- Estimate the financial support it will receive
- Plan responsibly for ministry, staffing, and mission

- How am I participating in what God is doing through this community?

A pledge is about participation—joining others in supporting worship, care, outreach, formation, and the shared life of the church.

If you've ever hesitated to make a pledge because of uncertainty, please know this: your pledge is an act of trust, not a demand. It is offered honestly, with room for change, and with the understanding that life circumstances can and do shift.

A pledge is simply a way of saying, "This church matters to me, and I want to help sustain its life and work."

2025 Statistics: What a year! In total we served 7,248 people from 2,494 visits with 78,721 pounds of food. People came from nine Bay County cities, with the vast majority from Bay City zip codes. We are blessed to be able to serve our community in this way.

Thinking about spring? Planning your garden? Consider planting a little extra to donate to the pantry! Fresh produce is a wonderful addition to our summer pantry options. All donations are appreciated.

Want to get involved? There are many ways you can join our pantry team! Volunteers are always welcome to help as your schedule allows. Talk to co-chairs Janet Smylie or Janet Beattie for more information or send an email to pantry@wpcbc.org.

- Help when the pantry is open by escorting guests through the pantry or volunteer to take their bags to their cars. Orientation/training is given before your first shift. We are open on Wednesdays from 4-6 p.m. and on Thursdays from 10 a.m. to noon. We need six volunteers each

day. You may also sign up on the bulletin board in the Wenona St. lobby.

- Have a truck? Deliveries from the Food Bank are dropped at a site in Bay City every other Monday morning. Join our crew of drivers who pick up the food, bring it to the church, and help get it into the church. You can stay to help stock the shelves or be on your way.
- Stock our shelves with food as directed by the shift leader. Food Bank deliveries are every other Monday at 9:30 a.m. and Hidden Harvest delivers every Wednesday at 12:30 p.m.

A New Year: Finding Your Way

As we enter 2026, for many this marks a new beginning, resolutions, and new possibility. We begin to create goals to help us find ourselves and accomplish what we want the next year to bring. We flip the page of the calendar and suddenly another new reality hits us on multiple levels: it's a new year without our loved one. Depending on where you are in

your grief journey, you may face the year with anxiety and longing for the comforts of the past. You may be fearful of what the new year may bring and wonder if you can handle any more challenges. Your emotions may be so raw that finding a way to get through one day is overwhelming; the notion of what to do with a whole year may seem unfathomable.

What does that mean for us physically, emotionally, socially, spiritually and cognitively? Time does move on; but we know, from our personal grief experience, that grieving doesn't work that way. We don't "move on." We change. We reconcile. We look forward, in our own good time, and revise our hopes for our future, with awareness that life as we knew it is no longer available to us. We cannot un-experience the experience of our loss. We will see our futures through the lenses of both life and loss and that

changes who we are now, how we see the world and decisions related to who we will become – in the coming year and beyond.

As you prepare for a new calendar year, full of new experiences and memories to be made, there is a process of not only looking back, but also looking ahead. Grief can be a reminder of what is really important to us, what we value and what brings us joy. It reminds us that we are still here, we have a future, and that we can in fact have some control over our future. Be patient with yourself and your grief.

New Year's Resolutions for the Bereaved: This year, I resolve to....

- Give myself time. Loving someone means loving them for my lifetime whether they are physically present or not.
- Tell their stories, the happy & the sad, they will live on through me.
- Encourage others to share memories.
- Teach others that they cannot "make me cry," my tears are an outward expression of how I am feeling.
- Understand that crying or otherwise expressing my pain is healthy & normal. "Doing well" means I am expressing myself.
- Understand that others may not understand my pain, and it isn't fair to expect them to do anything but listen.
- Do something nice for myself every day.
- Know that if today I cannot do everything that needs to be done, tomorrow is another chance to get it done.
- Cry when I need to, laugh when I can, and not feel guilty about either one.
- Let go, bit by bit, of the guilt, regret, and anger because I know holding on to these can be damaging.
- Take a risk and let others into my life and heart.
- Take care of my physical, emotional & spiritual self.
- Reinvest in life a little bit each day.
