The Gospel of Gumby — Blessed are the flexible

Sometimes we are going right along happily in our lives, and then something unusual happens that we aren't used to. Something changes. Something that can make us feel disoriented, even if only for a brief time. It is often at those moments that our lives are re-shaped.

Gumby, created in 1953, is a flexible character made from stretchable material. Alongside his clay horse friend Pokey, Gumby starred in a TV show where they could transform into different shapes and even return to their original clay forms.

The themes of moldability and adaptability in Gumby may reflect creator Art Clokely's own life: born in Detroit, Clokely's father died when he was 9 and then abandoned by his mother. While still a child, Clokely was adopted by a church musician and his wife. Later Clokely attended seminary and worked with his wife to produce religious films like Davey and Goliath. And although Clokely's spiritual journey was eclectic, some have viewed Gumby's malleable nature as a metaphor for spiritual flexibility and adaptability

Like Gumby – once a little green slab of clay - who adapts to any shape, individuals can embrace spiritual flexibility by staying open to God's will and adjusting their actions. This adaptability reflects the practice of surrendering personal desires to accept life's changes with an openness to change, with an open heart. "The Gospel according to Gumby."

In our re-shaped series we explored not only our capacity for change, but the idea that change is written into the very core of who we are as human beings...whether we like it or



not. The familiar passage from Jeremiah reminds of God's presence in the midst of change.

I went to the potter's house, and sure enough, the potter was there, working away at the wheel. Whenever the pot the potter was working on turned out badly, as sometimes happens when you are working with clay, the potter would simply start over and use the same clay to make another pot. Then God's Message came to me: "Can't I do just as this potter does, people of Israel?" God's Decree! "Watch this potter. In the same way that this potter works the clay, I work on you."

As we kick off this new year filled with programs and opportunities — outlined in this issue of the Log — we encourage you to explore how change and growth are possible through new experiences in our Westminster community of faith.

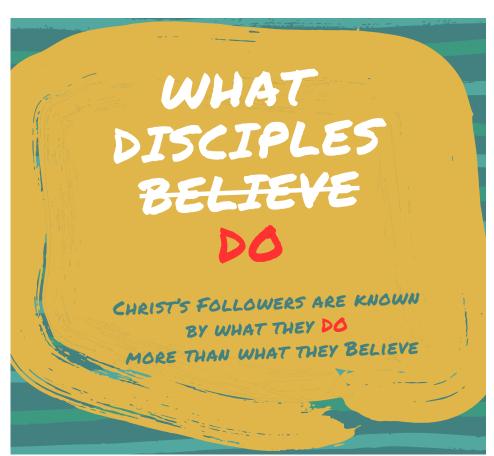

WHAT DISCIPLES BELIEVE DO WAYS TO GET INVOLVED

FALL WORSHIP SERIES

The textbook definition of "disciple" is someone "who accepts and assists in spreading the message of another." We might sum this up by saying that a disciple is "a follower." We are most familiar with the idea of a disciple from the Gospels as those who are followers of Jesus, specifically, the twelve people closest to Jesus. Living into our calling as modernday followers of Jesus, what the world calls "Christians," the word disciple applies to us as well. We are (or should be) disciples of Jesus.

I once heard someone say, "The world has a lot of Christians, but too few disciples." Throughout the Gospels, Jesus presents some difficult instructions for his disciples to follow. He notices that many of those who follow him are caught up in the emotional draw of the crowd following him. His difficult teachings ensure that those who commit themselves to being a disciple know what they are getting themselves into. He wants them to know what it means to truly follow him; to walk in his footsteps. Over the years, it has become easy to say that one is a Christian, without really being span the whole scriptural a disciple. We need the reminder that Jesus asks a lot of his disciples in the Gospels, and importantly, Jesus asks a lot of us today.



Although Christians are often identified by what they believe, Jesus seemed to care more about what his followers did. Putting our faith into practice, alongside of our theological beliefs, is what really matters. Over the course of our study and worship this fall, we will be exploring what disciples of lesus are called to **DO**, rather than what they are asked to **BELIEVE**. Our journey together will explore texts that Practice Generosity- Luke witness, from the Gospels, to Paul's letters, and passages from the Hebrew Scriptures as Disciples Serve with Faithwell.

We hope you'll join us as often as you can for this in depth look at discipleship as we explore ways to put our faith into action as lesus challenges us to live out our faithful call to discipleship.

Eugenia Anne Gamble has written a delightful and uplifting book that encourages us to deepen our relationship with God by looking inward – sensing God as the Gardener of our soul.

She begins with this Jewish proverb: "Before every person there marches an angel proclaiming, 'Behold, the image of God." That's you. Within you – the image of God. As Gamble writes in the introduction, "It is easy in the crush of responsibility and activity to lose sight of the part of us that is deepest and most true, the part that is in constant communion with the Spirit."

This Fall's retreat and the four-week writing group that will follow is designed to help us become more aware of the "being" part of ourselves in relationship with the Holy Spirit that lives within us.

Our reflecting and writing focus will be on the "fruit of the Spirit", not as a checklist that we use to evaluate our Christian life or a set of moral characteristics to master. This is not about fixing ourselves; instead, it is very much about "being" ourselves.

To help us tend that Wild Garden, we will begin with the retreat and then follow up with the opportunity to write and reflect on our awareness of the fruit of the Spirit in our own lives. We will meet weekly at 1:30 p.m. in the Lounge - with other "gardeners" to reflect and to write. Each week we will consider one fruit of the Spirit – love, joy, peace, patience – already growing within us. There will be an opportunity to journal, to write poetry, or maybe even write our own brief proverb like the one above.

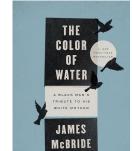


Don Clough was ordained as a Deacon and installed with Mary Rose Davis during worship on Sunday, August 17.

Cooler days signal the arrival of fall, making it a great time to relax with a book. And so, our Book Group starts in September. Four titles have been selected based on receiving the highest number of first-place votes, with each book earning at least two top rankings: *The Measure of a Man* by Sidney Poitier, *Everything Happens for a Reason, and Other Lies I Have Loved* by Kate Bowler, *The Color of Water* by James McBride, and *The First Phone Call from Heaven* by Mitch Albom.

After collecting the book suggestions, votes, and rankings, it's pretty clear that the group has diverse and eclectic reading interests. But even more notable were the comments you made that reflected an openness to participate in any selection made



by the group. Things like – "I'm in. It's just great to be together and read and share and laugh."

And so we begin ... *The Color of Water" by James McBride on **September 9th** during Kick Off Week at Westminster. This book alternates between the author's own life experiences and the life story of his mother, a Polish woman who emigrated to the U.S. as a child and

faced significant challenges including an abusive father and complexities of her Jewish heritage. Theirs is a beautiful and moving tribute to hope and faith, Jewish and Christian. You Can Hold Both ...

Grief brings all sorts of feelings to the surface. Some are expected, some are unexpected, and some are downright shocking. But what happens when you find yourself feeling conflicting emotions at the very same time?

Our brains like to feel safe and sure and are, therefore, used to thinking and feeling in black and white, all or nothing, either/or. Someone is either all bad or all good. Something is either totally easy, or totally impossible. We feel either happy or sad.

But suddenly, grief has opened this unsettling and confusing grey area of both/and. You may find yourself thinking, "How can I possibly be feeling both frustration and relief? Anger and gratitude? Longing and peace? Loneliness and support?" All these conflicting feelings make you feel like you're losing it or need to get yourself together.

And even more unsettling, since death and loss are, on the surface, something we have identified as bad, we often find ourselves feeling

guilty for feeling anything beyond that.

In these moments of doubt or guilt, it is important to remember that experiencing waves of hope, relief, happiness, or gratitude is not a betrayal of the person who has died. It is a part of loss. It doesn't indicate the absence of pain, grief, or deep sadness. The truth is that it is normal for opposing emotions to coexist. Grief, as in life, is not either/or; all or nothing...it is messy and full of complexities.

The loss you have experienced has revealed

in you the ability to hold two (or more) opposing feelings at the same time. It may not be a superpower, but it certainly reflects your strength and the deeply complex and beautiful relationships you share with one another.

At certain times or moments on your journey, it's hard to imagine having the capacity to hold anything but sadness, much less gratitude or happiness or hope. But trust that, in time, those moments will come, and you can hold both.

(and are normal & okay to feel):

I miss my loved one ... AND ... I am grateful for the time we shared.

I struggled with the difficulty and exhaustion of caretaking ... **AND** ... I am so glad I was able to care for my loved one.

I wish my loved one was still alive ... **AND** ... I am so glad they aren't suffering anymore.

I feel so exhausted by my grief, I don't want to get out of bed ... **AND** ... I am looking forward to playing with my grandchildren.

I am totally overwhelmed at the thought of going back to work ... **AND** ... I am looking forward to the distraction and routine.

The thought of looking at photos of my loved one breaks my heart ... **AND** ... I love seeing their smile and remembering the good times.

Doing the things we used to do together by myself makes me feel alone ... **AND** ... doing those things makes me feel closer to them.

I love them ... **AND** ... I am angry with them for leaving me with a mess of paperwork and bills to pay.

I dread seeing people I know at the grocery store because I might cry when they ask me how I am doing ... **AND** ... it is nice to be cared for and reminded of my support system.

Most of us know this to be true, but most of us have times of forgetting that truth in our own life experiences. We've been angry with ourselves for not taking more heroic steps for our loved one. Or sometimes have felt that no one understands what you're going through. Or been crabby and cried for no apparent reason. Maybe these feelings and many more. The fact is - You're absolutely normal.
