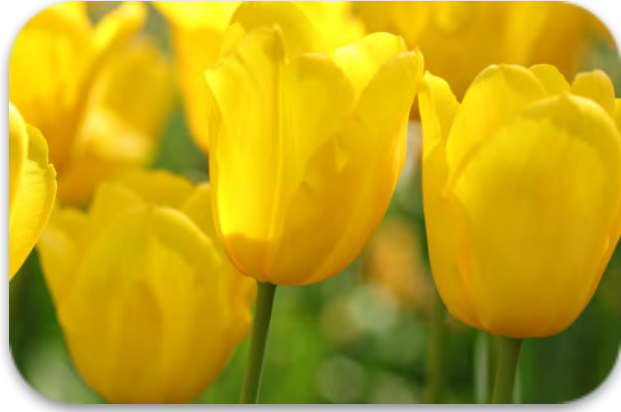

In March, the **Operating Fund** had income of \$34,423.45 and expenses of \$35,219.16. In addition to the normal, recurring costs we have to keep the church operating each month, the Mission Ministry made gifts to the Presbytery of Lake Huron, the Synod and General Assembly in March to fulfill their quarterly commitment to support the mission work of the greater church. New music was purchased for Holy Week, as well as other items for some of our Lenten services and other activities during Lent.

The **Building Improvement Fund** received contributions of \$317.00; there were no expenses in March. The fund balance at the end of the month is \$14,550.17 We're grateful to those who contribute to the Building Improvement Fund.

The **Major Repairs Fund** had income of \$357.00 in March and no expenses. The Major Repairs Fund has a balance at the end of March of \$42,015.28. Thank you to those who contribute to the Major Repairs Fund.

Contributions to the **Capital Campaign Fund** totaled \$12,213.01. In addition to our regular loan payment, we were able to put another \$25,000 on the principal of the loan, bringing the balance down to \$124,513.51. Thank you to everyone who has and is continuing to contribute to the Campaign. We're getting closer and closer to paying this off.

And then there is all of you, the congregation of Westminster. Every single day, I come to work and get to witness the ways you love this church, the ways you care for each other, how you give of your time and talents.

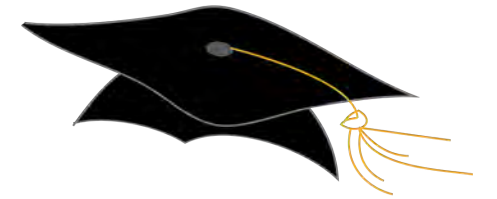
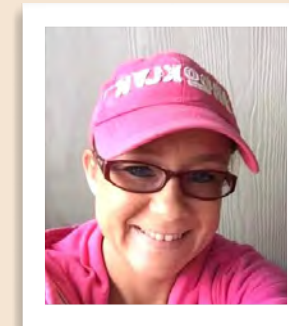
And so, over all these years, what I've tried to do, quite simply, is follow the example you all set. Needless to say, it's a high bar.

END OF SCHOOL BLOCK PARTY AND 2024 PENTECOST OFFERING

On June 4, 2023, our youth group, joined by dozens of volunteers from Westminster, and 5 community organizations, took a leap of faith. We had invited neighborhood school children, teens, and their families. We had secured a \$1000 grant, \$500 for a bike raffle, and donations of food. We were also supported by forty percent of the congregation's donations to the 2023 Pentecost Special Offering. By 12:30pm, everything was set up: the bounce house inflated, the popcorn hot, and the ice cream cold. And then we waited to see what the afternoon would bring.

Over the next three hours, we estimate around 300-350 people were welcomed to our space. We went through ALL our cotton candy, fruit, and gift bags. Our popcorn maker was busy the whole time, as were the "guardians" of the bounce house and our face painters! Several of our community partners in attendance remarked that it was one of the best such events they had attended.

This year, on **Sunday, June 2**, we're taking the opportunity to open our doors again, and we're asking for your help and support. If you have some time to help that afternoon, we'll have a place for you to serve. We'll need help with food, set up and clean up, volunteers for our hospitality tent with directions, gift bags, and other helpful information for our guests. We've been awarded a grant from the Bay Area Community Foundation to cover some of the costs, and any financial support is also welcome, either through direct donations, or by supporting the 2024 Pentecost offering we'll be collecting on Sunday, May 19th. Bell Choir Sunday

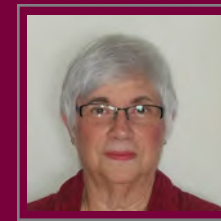

Reflections from Lent and Easter

I don't know about you but sometimes, even without knowing, I assume the minister can solve all the problems. I'm so glad I'm not the minister.

I've enjoyed our study of Peter. I believe his life can help me with mine. In Pastor Jamie's Easter sermon one line in particular stand out for me: "We can always try again." These words certainly hold comfort and hope. They have something to do with forgiveness. They encourage us to "try again".

It was some time ago that Pastor Linda lead a study on the book of Ecclesiastes. That's the book that says there is a time for everything-"A time to be born, and a time to die" etc. There is a piece of wisdom in Ecclesiastes that has helped me, that I have carried over time. The teacher or preacher in Ecclesiastes says we shouldn't necessarily "seize the day" or believe we are in control, or believe everything is up to us. Instead, we should calmly go about our day doing our tasks and allow the day to unfold as it will. I find when I follow this advice, my day goes better. I accomplish more. I find more joy.

Since much of Ecclesiastes is negative, the other day I felt a certain gladness when in our study of "Nine Essential Things I've Learned About Life," (A wonderful book, well worth reading!) Rabbi Kushner points to some joy in Ecclesiastes. "Go eat your bread in gladness and drink your wine with joy, and your acts will be approved by God... Enjoy happiness with someone you love all the fleeting days that have been granted you on this earth." (Ecclesiastes 9:7-9) In other words, we are to seek joy in living.

During this Lent and Easter, because of our church staff, we the congregation have shared many special and enjoyable moments. I hope you agree with me in saying our staff deserves our thanks and praise. Our church has much to be grateful for. (And thank you to Tom Tolles for the beautiful crosses!)

Our Loving Creator- Thank you for our church and all the love it embodies. Thank you for the many programs and activities our church provides. May we the congregates, be willing to participate and thus reap the many benefits. Amen.

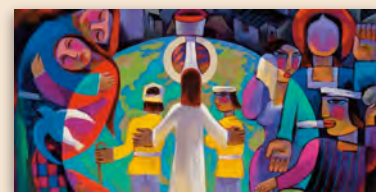

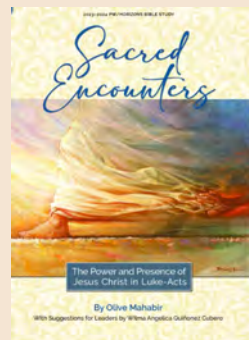
DEBORAH CIRCLE

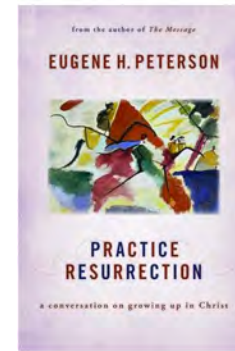


SPRING RUMMAGE SALE ON HOLD

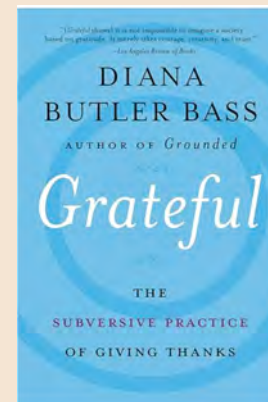


SUNDAY MORNING BIBLE STUDY

In this season of Easter, our Sunday morning Bible study is focusing on the letter of Paul to the Ephesians – and to all Christians even in this day and age, even here at Westminster Presbyterian Church. In addition to focusing on scripture, we are using the book – Practice Resurrection by Eugene Peterson – as a resource book to help us gain additional insights into the timeless message of Ephesians. In the introduction to his book, Peterson calls the book of Ephesians one of “soulcraft”– the formation of a mature life in Christ. He writes: “All of us are born. No exceptions. Birth brought us alive into a world that is vast, complex, damaged, demanding...and beautiful....Jesus used the birth event as a metaphor for another kind of birth: becoming alive to God...vast, complex, damaged, demanding and beautiful. Alive to God's holiness, God's will, kingdom, power, and glory.”

Please don't hear this as too abstract to have practical value in our everyday living; Ephesians is a down-to-earth help for our faith journey in the 21st Century. As Peterson wrote: “The Bible is not a book to carry around and read for information on God, but a voice to listen to.” Even if you haven't been able to attend thus far, you are invited to join us **Sunday mornings at 9 AM** in the Conference Room. NEW BOOK STUDY



If gratitude is good, why is it at times, so hard to do? In *Grateful*, Diana Butler Bass untangles our conflicting understandings of gratitude and sets the table for a renewed practice of giving thanks.

We know that gratitude is good, but many of us find it hard to sustain a meaningful life of gratefulness. Four out of five Americans report feeling gratitude on a regular basis, but those private feelings seem disconnected from larger concerns of our public lives. In *Grateful*, cultural observer and theologian Diana Butler Bass takes on this “gratitude gap” and offers up surprising, relevant, and powerful insights to practice gratitude.

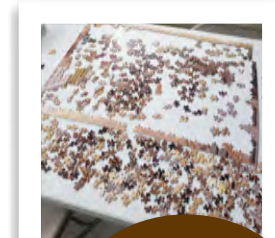
Bass, author of the award-winning *Grounded* and ten other books on spirituality and culture, explores the transformative, subversive power of gratitude for our personal lives and in communities. Using her trademark blend of historical research, spiritual insights, and timely cultural observation, she shows how we can overcome this gap and make change in our own lives and in the world.

With honest stories and heartrending examples from history and her own life, Bass reclaims gratitude as a path to greater connection with god, with others, with the world, and even with our own souls. It's time to embrace a more radical practice of gratitude—the virtue that heals us and helps us thrive.

We've already gotten a great start on a puzzle featuring Main Street on Mackinac Island.

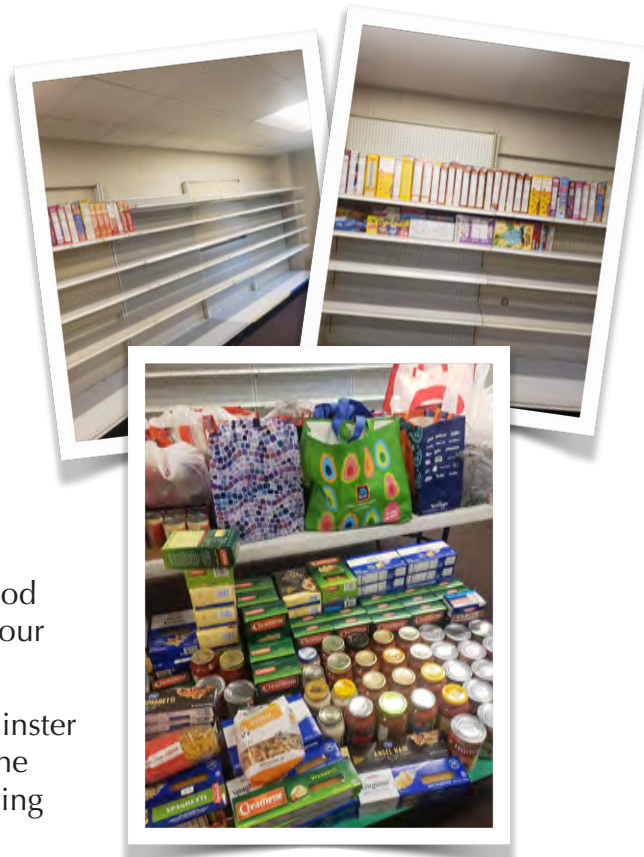
GRATEFUL SCHEDULE

Healing Through Nature: Nature can serve as a powerful healer during times of grief. Individuals might find comfort in the sights, sounds, and smells of spring, allowing them to connect with something larger than themselves and find a sense of peace amidst their pain.

Acceptance of Change: Spring is a season of change, as winter gives way to warmer temperatures and longer days. Individuals could experience a parallel journey of accepting the changes that come with loss, ultimately finding growth and transformation in the process.

Remember:
 Your grief is your own. It may sneak up in mementos that feel inconvenient. But the loss of someone you love was never something that was convenient. So your grief won't be either. You will grieve. You will cry. You will break down. You will be a mess. But you don't owe anyone an apology for how you choose to grieve. Grief is messy. Grief is unkind. Grief comes bearing a heaviness you didn't know about before. But in that grief what you find is the kind of people who will at least try to lighten the load of what it is you're carrying. No one can bring them back or make that pain go away. But on the other side of this coin is that grief is so much love for someone who left too soon.

April brought rain and a shift from being cooped inside to a sudden desire to be outside. Many may host parties, invite you to outings, and have more energy than you feel at this moment.

During your springtime grief, it's essential to acknowledge and validate your emotion, even if they don't align with the season's outwardly positive atmosphere. Seeking support from friends, family or a therapist can provide a safe space to process your feelings and find comfort during this challenging time. Additionally, finding ways to honor and remember your loved one can help you navigate grief while still embracing themes of growth and renewal in your own time and way.

Spring and grief can intertwine in various poignant and meaningful ways, reflecting the complex nature of human emotions and the cycles of life. Here are a few ideas:

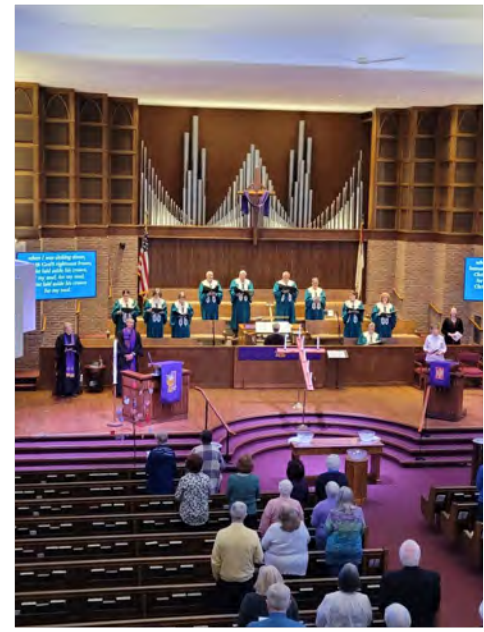
STARGAZERS AND SOULSEARCHERS
